Micro-credentials Wales policy major milestones

Wales: actively exploring and implementing policies related to MCs as part of broader strategies for education, skills, and workforce enhancement.

Currently no policies explicitly focus on MCs,

Welsh Gov been supportive of initiatives aimed at increasing the accessibility and relevance of MCs in alignment with the Lifelong Learning Strategy

The Learning and Skills Act (2000): Statutory framework for **lifelong learning**. Welsh Govt Duty to promote lifelong learning, outlining provisions for adult learning, FE, and training.



2017: Adult learning Wales Policy

A Wales where learning is at the core of all we do; where participation in learning is encouraged and rewarded; and where people have equal opportunities to gain the skills for life

- Fair and Equitable, Quality Assured, Funded fairly, Local
- Essential, digital and employable skills, 'hook' courses






Current Micro-credential Offering in Wales



Policy and position summary

Position

- Growing interest and development across Wales
- 7 are currently offering microcredentials, 3 are planning to develop, 2 have no plans to develop micro-credentials in the near future
- Many offer short credit and non-credit courses
- Range of modules sizes, topics, delivery methods
- Some pan-University activity and some HE/FE partnerships

Policy

- No one overarching policy supporting Micro-credentials in Wales
- QAA Character Statement 2022 is really the main quality assurance benchmark
- No consistent credit alignment between or delivery method
- Internal approaches to stacking qualifications only
- No common agreed quality assurance mechanisms
- No common agreed transcript or digital certificate
- No common agreed portability process
- No agreement on fees, no loan entitlement
- Fee waivers for 30 credits per year, not fully capitalized on by providers



On-going barriers


- No one overarching policy supporting Microcredentials in Wales
- Internal systems and processes: Enrolments, fees, admission, marketing,
- Sustainability: Limited seed-funding, un-viable continuous delivery

Context for microcredentials in Northern Ireland

No formal policy position from the Dept for the Economy

Microcredential Working Group established - Universities, FE Colleges and Teaching Colleges all represented.

Limited microcredential offer in place:

- Ulster University using in widening participation partnership activity
- Professional body certificates in FE Colleges
- Open University microcredentials (not Northern Ireland specific)

Significant adult learning fund for upskilling/reskilling activity from 2021 – 2024: "Skill Up"

- Levels 1 7
- Provision had to carry formal credit

Significant microcredential investment in the Republic of Ireland - "MicroCreds"

Govt funding for course infrastructure and to offset fee costs to learners



Microcredential Working Group - Northern Ireland

POINTS OF CONSENSUS

- 1. The primary audience for microcredentials will be those who are currently in the workforce who want to upskill.
- 2. Microcredentials could be an important vehicle for enabling employers to address organisational skills gaps.
- 3. Stackability of microcredentials is not seen as the initial priority.
- 4. There should be a consistent approach to the definition of a microcredential in Northern Ireland and a clear and simple offer across institutions aligning to one framework.
- 5. Government investment will be key to greater uptake of microcredentials.
- 6. There should be a microcredential brand for Northern Ireland.
- 7. The initial focus should be on reframing existing provision towards being a microcredential offer rather than starting from scratch.
- 8. The microcredential offer must have currency both across Ireland and across the rest of the UK.
- 9. Accessibility should be at the heart of microcredentials.

What has been happening?

- June 2021: <u>SFC National Review Scottish Funding Council</u> -Coherent and Refreshed Tertiary approach to Skills Planning, including Micro-Credentials, with a single Quality framework (QAA)
- Enhance access to shorter, targeted courses that support lifelong learning
- Pilot a National Micro-Credential Framework and Delivery Plan to certify bite-sized learning and explore how modules may be combined to form larger qualifications over time.

What has been happening?

Scottish Tertiary Education Network for Micro-credentials 2021-2023

- Established a Scottish central point for advice, guidance, discussion and expertise regarding the sector understanding and delivery of micro-credentials and small qualifications
- Developed and published a glossary of terminology in relation to micro-credentials and small qualifications
- Discussed, disseminated and promoted models of practice for effective partnerships in the delivery of micro-credentials
- Worked to agree and plan the development of resources for the Scottish Sector in relation to the design delivery and quality assurance of micro-credentials in Scotland

- Evaluated the evidence from survey analysis, state of the nation report and collaborative cluster findings and those from wider afield to understand the status of the design, delivery and quality assurance of micro-credentials and small qualifications
- Investigated current knowledge, understanding and terminology in respect of micro-credentials within the tertiary sector was circulated in November 2021 within the survey
- A state of the nation 'scan' was undertaken in autumn 2021 to review the current micro-credentials on offer in Scotland and the ease with which prospective students could access this information directly from HEI websites. A summary of the findings from this scan were presented at the first meeting to inform discussion.
- Findings from the collaborative cluster project were published on the Enhancement Themes website and can be accessed <u>here.</u>

What has been happening?

- The first meeting of the Scottish Tertiary Education Network for Micro-Credentials was held on 30 January 2024;
- QAA Glossary <u>Scottish Tertiary Education Micro-Credentials</u> <u>Glossary (qaa.ac.uk)</u>
- Joint chairs appointed
- 3 workstreams: Employers, Students, Institutions, with Communication a golden thread
- The role of SCQF in credit rating reinforced
- International and rUK perspectives: Find your next course on MicroCred Seeker: start learning now
